

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THE EXHIBITION

The Lyon Museum of Contemporary art presents from March 3d to July 11th 2010 the most important retrospective dedicated to the artist Ben Vautier. He is one of the major XXth century artists, known for its performances, installations and paintings.

For the first time, this exhibition relates the entire work of this great artist, important member of the Fluxus movement.

This exhibition shows 50 years of works on more than 3000m²: from the very beginning at Nice to the most recent works, through his appropriations, performances, paintings and installations. This event also includes new videos and works created especially for this occasion. All the recurrent topics dear to Ben are exhibited, gathered by series: Bananas, Ego, Gestures, Ethnos, Sex, Truth etc. Ben plays with these topics and the langage to question art, but also ego and truth with as serious as humour.

The first floor of the museum is devoted to the historical part of Ben's carreer, and includes a large choice of works in the *Fluxus** spirit. Divided in 5 thematic spaces (Concept/Appropriations from 1958 to 1970, Gestures, Forms, Bananas and Writings), it presents in particular almost all *Fluxus* works of the MoMA 's collection.

The second floor of the exhibition is organized around the monumental work, the *Bizart Baz'art* and 20 spaces on themes as Money, Sex... It leads to discover the profuseness of Ben's work.

The third floor explores the Ego's concept which underlies the all work of Ben, through topics such as Philosophy, Self-criticism, Introspection...

Placing Ben's work in its historical context, this huge retrospective gives visitors the opportunity to improve is understanding of a universe often only superficially known. The curatorship of this exhibition is entrusted to a Fluxus specialist, the american art historian Jon Hendricks, who oversees the all Fluxus part of the exhibition and the realization of the catalogue.

Jon Hendricks is an artist and consulting curator of the Gilbert and Lila Silverman *Fluxus* Collection at the Museum of Modern Art, New York, and curator of Yoko Ono Exhibitions.

He has edited and co-edited a number of books: "Make a Salad", Fluxus Scores and Instructions; The Transformative Years with Marianne Bech and Media Farzin (Museet for Samtidskunst, 2008), What's Fluxus? What's Not! Why (Centro Cultural/Banco do Brasil and Silverman Fluxus Collection, Detroit, 2003), Fluxus Codex (Abrams, 1988) and Yes YOKO ONO, with Alexandra Munroe (Abrams, 2000).

Hendricks has curated numerous exhibitions of both *Fluxus** and of Yoko Ono's work in museums in many countries. Hendricks is a member, with Jean Toche, of GAAG (Guerilla Art Action Group), created in 1969. From 1966 to 1968, Hendricks was the director of the Judson Gallery at Judson Memorial Church in New York.

^{*} Fluxus is an amorphous group initiated by George Maciunas in 1962, bringing together artists from all around the world, from George Brecht to Nam June Paik and from Ben Patterson to Joseph Beuys.




THE CATALOGUE

This retrospective comes along with a reference book recounting the whole Ben's work. More than a catalogue, it is an original book, with a variety of approaches, historical, scientific, and humorous.

Essays specifically realised for this book including the recurring and essential topics of Ben's work (ego, concept, gesture, paradox, Fluxus, performance...) are written by specialist and scientist authors: Arthur Danto, Jean-Hubert Martin, Midori Matsui, Hans Ulrich Obrist, Susanne Rennert and Philippe Vergne.

Besides, it includes a complete biography of the artist and a reference bibliography, a wide iconography of about 300 illustrations, from historical photographs to very recent images of the artist in his workshop.

A preface by Thierry Raspail, director of the Lyon Museum of contemporary art, and an historical text by Jon Hendricks opens the book.

THE AUTHORS

Arthur Danto

Philosopher and art critic, Arthur Danto is mainly known for his works in analytical aesthetics. He is not only one of the most important art theorists but also an influential critic who publishes his articles, among others, in *The Nation, Naked Punch Review* and *Artforum*.

Jean-Hubert Martin

Jean-Hubert Martin has been director of many institutions in France or abroad, among them Kunsthalle, Bern, the National Museum of Modern Art, Paris, the Museum Kunst Palast, Dusseldorf. He curated the exhibition *Magiciens de la terre* in 1989 and several biennials of art, such as the Biennial of Lyon (*Partages d'exotisme*, 2000) and Moscow Biennial, 2009.

Midori Matsui

Midori Matsui is an art critic. She teaches at the University of Art "Tama and Musashino", Tokyo.

Hans Ulrich Obrist

Independent curator, Hans Ulrich Obrist is currently co-director for exhibitions and programs and director of the international projects at the Serpentine Gallery in London.

Susanne Rennert

Specialist of the Fifties and Sixties. Since 2007, she is curator of the Gerhard Hoehme Foundation at the Museum Kunst Palast in Dusseldorf.

Philippe Vergne

Philippe Vergne is the director of the DIA Art Foundation in New York.
